Travel Insurance: Many of our TLC members occasionally leave their van at home and venture off overseas. May last year we booked a European River Cruise for June this year. An upfront part of our process is – always – to secure a Travel Insurance policy that covers our age, pre existing medical conditions and cancellation. All stitched up and Tour operator paid (lotsa \$'s) - we flew out for Paris on June 1 for our 26 day holiday. Our 3rd day in Paris (and the day before moving to Amsterdam to embark on our River Cruise) the Tour operator called a meeting. "Sorry – but the rest of your holiday has been cancelled due to the record rains and flooding along the river systems. Because the event is classified as an Act of God we are not liable to compensate you for the cancellation – you should claim against you Travel Insurer". It seems that most people in our group had paid for the cancellation "option" which covers such an event - but we know of 1 couple who, in their struggle to secure cover for a pre existing health condition, overlooked the fact that cancellation cover is "optional". We departed Paris for home

2 days later. The Industry has a slogan – "If you can't afford Travel Insurance – you can't afford to travel". – Wendy/Alan

Drifting Northwards: We are at the beginning of our 3rd week of our travels, we spent a wonderful week at Happy Hallidays with our great caravan members & friends. We left last Monday arriving at the Grafton showground on Monday we had a little delay with the car fortunately covered by warranty, spent 3 nights there. We then travelled to Moree just over night, then to the very interesting Lightning Ridge where we spent 2 delightful days it just happened the annual Opal festival was on & lucky to have been able to have the last available powered site available .

We had a ½ day tour of the area going down 22metres underground to a mine that opened 100yrs ago, now only open for tourists.

After the tour we went back to an underground mine still operating we went down 60 – 80 feet underground, we thought it would be really scary but it was good because the whole area was well lit. The current owner is very artistic & has carved murals on each side of the walls on the sandstone of the very narrow areas the miners have worked. We were lucky to have met a lady called Robina who has been a resident & business lady in the area with her late husband Val for 34years.. Robina taught us so much about the area, the tour guides seem to tell so many porky pies. Robina told us about the cash deals, the very successful miners who are cash millionaires' & collecting the dole.

On now over the border and stopped for lunch at a very memorable place called Hebel where everything served is homemade. Then to St George a very pretty area we are free camping beside

the river, lots of travellers told us we should stay here Our next adventure will be Roma. Till then cheers Sue/Grame xx

A Day at Wingham "Wingham (Flying Fox Trip)" was listed on the Program of Events as an activity during our stay at Happy Hallidays. Having already decided that flying foxes were not on our agenda, our car set off for Wingham, with the plan of visiting the museum.

The drive was quite pleasant and conversation flowed freely – Ern and Richard recalling old times of 50-60 years ago; Mary, Thelma and Lorraine enjoying the opportunity to have lots of "girl talk". First stop was indeed Wingham Museum, and what a museum it is! We were charged an entry of only \$3 each which proved to be excellent value for money as there was just so much to look at. The displays were first-rate and it was indeed a pleasure to make a comment in the Visitors Book.

The ladies marvelled at how our mothers and grandmothers coped with doing the cooking, cleaning and laundry with the equipment they had available in those days. We reminisced over old office apparatus such as comptometers and typewriters etc., admired the household linen and crockery on display and found that we were often commenting – "I remember those", or "Mum had one just like that". It was a bit of a scary thought to find those so-well-remembered items in a *museum!* The men also enjoyed looking at the displays of old machinery, uniforms, tools of trade (some of which they had actually used themselves in their 'working days') and many other things that really took them back to a by-gone era. During the time we were at the museum, we met up with several other T.L.C. members who also thoroughly enjoyed their visit.

After we had soaked up all this nostalgia, it was time for some lunch and we headed off to the Sunnyside Café in the main street. The meals were really sumptuous – talk about country cooking! Our trip to Wingham concluded with shopping for the ladies – a quick browse through some of the local fashion stores and, of course, the obligatory visit to the Op Shop. Exhausted, we re-joined the men and finally returned to the car to drive back to our vans – after all, it would soon be Happy Hour back at Hallidays! Lorraine Laney

Living the Dream: 28th May to Friday 28th June
We spent 5 nights at a free camp at Longreach, some nights there were 150 vans.

Peter took the Engel to have it looked at only to be told it would cost about \$700 and the parts would have to come from Melbourne, we decided to keep it as an ice box, much cheaper.

We went to the QANTAS museum, they had some very interesting information regarding the commencement of the service, we also went on a tour of a 747 200 which had been flown to Longreach especially for the museum. It was going to land on an airstrip ½ the width and length it had been designed for and so it had to be stripped out to make it lighter and carry only enough fuel to get it to Longreach or if necessary, on to Sydney. There was concern as to being able to get pilots to fly it so they advertised and had about 300 applicants apply, they then had to sift through to get the most suitable ones. They also had the first Boeing 707 sold outside America there with its own interesting story, it was sold for scrap and it was then restored and converted to a luxurious plane to be hired out, Michael Jackson was one who hired it before the Saudis purchased it. It was later gifted to

England in appreciation of their 'military arms sales', then it was mothballed at South Hampton, later to be discovered by a museum enthusiast. Because it was going to be shown in a museum all the gold trimmings, gaming tables, bars etc had to be removed so as not to offend the Saudis.

We watched a Hercules land at the site. The original QANTAS planes were built in the hangar and were made of fabric and glued onto timber frames.

As we travel we are passing road trains 53+ meters long, some of the roads are only 1 lane wide so when they go past you have to get off the road as they don't slow down.

Leaving Longreach we arrived at Winton and stayed behind the North Gregory Hotel, another freeby, for 2 nights. We visited the Australian Age Of Dinosaurs. They have a nearly complete carnivorous dinosaur named Banjo and another dinosaur named Matilda, these are over 100 million years old. The bones were found near the Jumpup where they are now shown. We also went to the laboratory where they are cleaning bones ready to be put together like a jigsaw puzzle.

I was allowed to hold a piece of dinosaur bone about 100 million years old.

Next we travelled to a rest area at Fullerton River North for the night before heading to Cloncurry

On to Mary Kathleen, a mining ghost town, the mine was commenced in 1958 and worked for 10 years supplying Uranium, gold and copper.

The mine reopened in 1971 and was closed for the last time in 1982 with all the houses sold and everything else auctioned off, all had to be removed off the property leaving only the concrete carports and other concrete flooring unable to be removed.

The township was complete with swimming pool, school, preschool, tennis courts, netball courts, oval, gymkhana grounds, cinema, golf and bowling club, supermarket, churches, halls, canteen, wet canteen etc, it also had single men's quarters. It had a population of approximately 1000.

This has been restored back to private property and the owner said this area is referred to as the town paddock and goes for 70 klms one way and 60 klms towards Mt Isa, the acres across the highway are also part of this property. I found silver and copper there, a 1951 sixpence and a 1954 half penny.

Next stop, Mount Isa, just 60 klms from Mary Kathleen, a big drive. Here we stayed at a caravan park as there is no free camping allowed near the town.

We went on an underground mine tour, the Hard Times Mine, this is only a replica for tourism as no one is allowed in the actual mines, quite informative about how mining was done before 'all the air con vehicles' were brought into the mines. Most of the equipment was extremely dangerous, maiming and killing workers.

We next went on a city tour, this included the 'underground hospital' that was dug out during the war when Darwin was bombed, the miners did their 8 hours in the mine and then volunteered another 4 hours to dig the hillside to accommodate an emergency hospital. Luckily this was never used as Mount Isa was too far for a return trip for the Japanese planes. We also saw the only remaining 'tent house' which is being restored, they were built as 'quick fix' housing, having dirt floors, tin roof and canvas walls. They were cheap and easy to build and quickly relocated. This one has been relocated to beside the 'underground hospital'.

Peter took the Engel to another refrigeration mechanic and he was able to

repair the Engel, it was only a loose connection and cost us \$66. What a joke!

Leaving Mount Isa, we travelled back to Cloncurry then heading north towards Burke and Wills Roadhouse then across to Gregory Downs where we camped beside the Gregory River, floating down the river each day on 'noodles'.

The first day we ventured upstream and had to come down through the rapids, only did this the first day then we went down the river from where our van is floating until we reached another set of rapids, leaving the stream then and walking back to go again, sometimes it took longer to return to the start as there are so many people to talk to on the way.

We went for a day trip to Lawn Hill Gorge and Adel Grove. Adel grove was named after the French botanist, Albert de Lestang, who started a plantation of exotic trees in 1920. Many of his plants are in the Botanical Parks in QLD now.

There are camp grounds at both Lawn Hill and Adel Grove but why move from where we are right beside a river. We also did a day trip to Burketown about 120 klms away, most of this was bitumen. There is about 10 klms of gravel but they are working on this at present and soon it will be all bitumen. Burketown was first explored in 1841 and settled by the 1860's. Burketown is also known as the 'Barramundi Capital of Australia'.

Last weekend was the 'camp draft' competition here so we wandered over. It is interesting watching the riders herding the beast through 'gates' as if they were trying to muster it. There were many competitors from stations as far as Camowear including young children. Some of the children came down to the river to paddle their canoes and just play in the river.

We have been at Gregory River for 11 nights now so it is time to pack up our

'noodles' and van and head towards Karumba.

We decided to camp beside the Flinders River, about 50 klms south of Normanton, near the causeway where they drove 1500 head of cattle across moving them from one paddock to another about 30 klms away. It is amazing how 7 people on horseback and two on bikes can control this number of beasts beside the road as well.

We were told that just up the river there were about 50 crocs but we didn't see any, thank goodness.

We are now at Karumba for 4 nights staying at a new caravan park behind the service station, the sites are large and there is grass here.

There are signs near the beaches advising that crocs inhabit the area and can cause injury or death, so no swimming here for me. The people that come here every year to get away from the cold in Victoria and NSW are disappointed with the fishing season.

Because there was no wet season last year the fish are not biting. The fishermen are still keen as there are lots of boat trailers parked up at the boat ramp each day, they are catching a few fish but not the amount of previous years. Peter caught 4 bream yesterday, so we had fresh fish for dinner.

This afternoon we are going on a sunset cruise, dinner will be fresh prawns and mudcrabs, platters of fruit with beer and wine.

The weather has been great with temperatures up to 30°C and no rain.

No winter woollies needed here! We have now travelled over 6500 klms. Ellen/Peter xx

Still Drifting North: Sunday afternoon we arrived at the Apex free camp in Longreach beside the river where about

60 other free campers are here as well. A family ready to move on called us over said take his spot as there was still plenty of heat left in ½ a 44 drum full of hot coals, Sue took the opportunity to take some mincemeat out of the freezer & in an hour its ready for dinner, smelled and tasted delicious.

To date we have travelled just over 3000k's the weather has been very cool at night, down to 4c up to 34c during the days everywhere the ground is very dry & dusty (Red dust) the locals tell us that there has not been rain since the floods in December 12. They depend on artesian water which is hot when it comes out of the bores & is pumped into tanks to cool off & is safe & nice to drink. We have lit fires each night & cooked our meals & sat beside the fires to keep warm "till bedtime, we have even had a few dampers cooked in the camp oven for supper.

At Charleville we saw through a secret American air base used from 1942 to 1946 the American air force & has only a few years ago released it back to Australia. A very interesting place during its peak 4000 service personnel were stationed there.

Then to Augathella where the movie Smiley was filmed. We met Hugh & Dawn a Victorian couple who we get along well with & have travelled, camped & sight seen together through Tambo, Blackall, Barcaldine, Ilfracombe & now at Longreach.

Each place we have seen we are very impressed with the extent of unique history, the locals are pleased to share their own experiences. We plan to spend a few days here then find our way to Winton for a few days.

We have done as follows: 5th today, The Stockman's Hall of Fame, 3 hours, a great

experience to see how things were back in those early days.(early Australia at the start) Tomorrow Tuesday 6th, 8am Cobb & Co coach trip along the original tracks that the coaches went in those early days. This apparently included a full gallop of the coach!!!! 6pm Stockman's dinner and outback show.

Wednesday 7th 8.30am, A special time as we are booked to tour the Qantas display, Boeing 707, and 747 plus other exhibits. My Brother John flew both these actual planes prior to retiring.

Next stop Mt. Isa where we part company with Hugh & Dawn as we are going different direction. Cheers "till next time G n S xoxo
