#### THE CRANKY MEN TRIP

We arrived at Glen Innes Showground just before lunch and were spoilt for sites. After lunch we did a drive up to the lookout and checked out the town. Some lovely façades on the old buildings. We had a lovely afternoon with coffee in the old bank which is now a cafe.

We had happy hour and Des shared some great poetry

and stories with us. After dinner some of us caught up with a few others for dessert and drinks. Of course, I was dared to climb into the cage which I did.



13<sup>th</sup> March on my early morning walk I took on part of the heritage Walk. It was lovely to see all the lovely well-maintained facades of the old buildings. Even Coles is found in an old building built in 1885 the 1st store in Glen Innes. You don't even realise that Coles is opened and in here as it has none of the outside signs. It even

has the original art Deco glass



We went out to the Australian Standing Stones where we had a lovely morning tea . As I had only seen the Australian Standing Stones 12 months ago I enjoyed the sun while the others took in these rocks which were erected in 1991 as a monument to the Celtic people. We headed to Emmaville and invaded

this small country pub for lunch. Seeing there was 18 of us, with no notice, they did a wonderful job. We headed across the road to the museum where the owner gave us a bit of a spiel about the town. Emmaville owned by Scotsman Gordan. In 1872 piano tuner fossicked and found tin. He staked a claim near Deepwater but never worked the land and sold for an extravagant amount to a large cooperation. It was




originally known as Vegetable Creek and was where the Chinese camp was. Chinese at one stage outnumbered Europeans as they came to stake claims to mine for tin. The name was changed name in 1882 to Emmaville.

Debbie Wells from Emmaville was the youngest Olympian at 15 yrs competes 1st in 1976. She was 100m sprinter and known as the Emmaville Express and her parents still live in the town. The museum was an eclectic collection but was excellent with a large gem display.

Thursday 14th March saw another pack up and moving on to Tenterfield. Even thought it was only 100km we stopped in at Deepwater for morning tea. The little cafe was decorated with seats to represent motor cars. We stopped at the bakery to grab Jimmy a pie for lunch before going around and checking out the old railway station. There was also a little old house still occupied but would be great to do up. We headed to Tenterfield and set up and had lunch. We then went for a drive on

Tourist Route 9. The country side was beautiful with cattle and sheep strolling across the road as we meandered along the road. It was amazing to see large rock outcrops that were beautiful. We stopped and had a look at Mount Mackenzie Lookout which overlooks Tenterfield. The last thing on our list to see was a huge cork tree. It is hard to imagine how light this wood is.

Friday  $15^{th}$  March Another day of many things planned the 1st thing we checked out was the F1-11 crash site where 2 pilots lost their life in a training exercise.



It was then on to Thunderbolts Hideout. Here he used it as a hunting and hiding ground. WW2 Tank Traps were next. These were low profile, defensive positions against tanks.



Bald Rock NP and lunch. Bald Rock is a challenging climb up the largest granite rock in Australia. At various levels up the rock the view is spectacular and ever changing. On the way back we called passed some decorated hay bails that Chris and John had found on an earlier drive.

We ended the day with a lovely meal at the bowling club.

supplies and then onto Cranky Rock. Cranky Rocks apparently got its name from a 'cranky' Chinaman who murdered a Warialda woman. The legend goes that he was chased by the police and evading capture by leaping

off the high rock to his death. Leading to the tale of Cranky Rock.

After we were all set up and explored the area, we all came together for happy hour, (with the many chooks that wanted to share with us) then went off and had dinner but came back together for the Cranky Rock Movie night.
